Graduation requirement:

- In accordance with MCU General Provisions for Study, all undergraduate students must pass the requirements for Service-Learning, English Proficiency, Information Technology Proficiency, Chinese Proficiency, Sports Ability, and Basic Professional Skills in order to graduate. The professional basic ability test and standards that students of Leisure and Recreation Administration Department are required to pass during their study at MCU are itemized as follows: (1) Professional ability in Leisure and Recreation Administration: Complete a graduation thesis as a team. (2) Theory application and practical ability: Complete 400 hours of internship on and off campus, submit a reflection report, and pass the evaluation of the employer and the Department. (3) Leisure Programming Capability: Earn CPR certificate and at least one professional certificate in Leisure and Recreation Management.
- The minimum credits for graduation is 128 credits, including 28 university required credits (including 12 credits of General Education), 3 School required credits, 50 department required credits, 47 department elective credits.
- Up to 4 credits of the total credits earned for Physical Education courses will be recognized. Additional course credits earned in General Education, teacher education program or courses offered by other departments cannot be counted in the total number of credits required for obtaining a Bachelor's degree.
- Students have to earn at least 12 General Education credits before graduation, which should include at least one course each from Humanities, Social Sciences, and Natural Sciences. These categories are sub-divided into core and extended courses, and at least one 2-credit course from each subdivision under each category must be completed to qualify for graduation.
- In principle, students in each department should earn at least 47 elective credits within their own department. Credits not listed on the graduation framework under cross-disciplinary Focused Course Programs may be counted as credits from other departments. If other departments' courses are approved by the department Chair, up to 21 credits of such electives may be counted toward graduation credits. Students can retake other required courses with the same name from another department upon approval by the department chair.
- This course outline and the cancellation of prerequisite requirements may be applied to all students admitted prior to 2024-25 academic year.
- Students are required to complete one focused course program before graduation.
- Graduating students and students in the extended study period who did not pass required courses of Physical Education can waive a maximum of two (2) required Physical Education courses by passing Comprehensive Physical Education I, Comprehensive Physical Education II. This regulation is applicable for those admitted in and prior to 2020-21 academic year.
- If International students, overseas students or students from Hong Kong and Macao are not good at Chinese, they can take the courses of Basic Chinese I & II through International College instead of taking Chinese Literature: Appreciation and Creative Writing I & II. This regulation can be applied to students who entered the university prior to the 2021-22 academic year.
- Students who are retaking the University Core Required Courses, "Introduction of Artificial Intelligence" or "Software Program Design" can only take courses offered in their own department. If there is a conflict in class schedule or other unavoidable situation, students may take a course offered by another department in the same School with the consent of their original department. (Summer courses are not restricted to this limitation).
- Foreign students, overseas Chinese students, Hong Kong students and Macao students may select the following courses to waive "Chinese Literature: Appreciation and Creative Writing I and II" once the related test confirms that they have insufficient Chinese ability: "Basic Mandarin I and II" or "Chinese Literature I and II". This may also be retroactively applied to students who entered the university prior to the 2023-24 academic year.
